

Ten years of research on temporary clusters: what do we know and what we don't know

Research mandate - Supervised project

The last decade has witnessed a surge of research interest in temporary clusters research. This has resulted in important insights concerning the role of temporary clusters in supporting economic processes of interactive learning and knowledge sharing and the way they are organized spatially and temporally. The objective of this project is to provide the first comprehensive systematic review of the temporary cluster literature, including a critical assessment of these research efforts, and offer suggestions for the future of temporary clusters in the context of the current COVID-19 crisis.

The research mandate (about 12,500 -15,000 words):

- To conduct a systematic literature review on temporary cluster with the objectives to describe how the temporary cluster research field has developed, charts the current body of research and discusses recommendations for moving the temporary research field forward.
- The current stock of knowledge about temporary cluster research is assessed by examining published material (about 50 articles that will be provided) from 2010 until 2019.
